

This term comes at a pivotal time for our nation. Our Legion Family will be headed to the polls this fall, as once again we decide who will lead this country for the next four years, and who will represent us in the U.S. Congress. Though we are nonpartisan, the American Legion Family believes in the power of the vote and responsible citizenship.

Dozens of our Nebraska American Legion Family members recently attended the 105th Annual National Convention in New Orleans. James A Lacoursiere Jr from Connecticut is our new National Commander. His first comment was, "Don't change what's working." Be the One to help end veteran suicide will continue to be the American Legion priority.

During our National Convention, VA Secretary Denis McDonough said the 2022 Legion backed PACT Act has created thousands of increases in VA enrollment, and healthcare claims. He noted, that VA has exceeded projections, and that a twelve billion dollar increase in the fiscal 2024-2025 budget is necessary to provide care for the spike in VA patients. Unless Congress passes legislation to cover the shortfall before the end of the fiscal year, (this month); there could be a delay in VA disability payments. To contact your Senators and Congressional Representative, go to Legion. org/action and scroll to VA Funding Shortfall.

It was noted that Presidential Candidates chose to NOT speak at The American Legion National Convention.

The American Legion is about building relationships and mentoring. We are about pride and purpose. I have mentioned before, my motto this year is Character, Values and Integrity. Character makes a difference. The American Legion Family changes lives and saves lives. Integrity is not negotiable, and the only thing that does not depreciate over time. These traits represent our organization and are important for us to function as a cohesive American Legion Family. For the past 12 years, I have been honored to serve as your Department Historian – thank you to Past Department Commander (PDC) Fred Craigie for selecting me and to all the PDCs after Fred who asked me to stay on! It has been an honor to preserve the memories of the Department each and every year, culminating in beautful yearbooks that the Department can enjoy for many years to come. With that being said, the Department, which has supported me from day one, submitted my name for consideration as the National Historian back in 2015. I am proud

to say that after nine years on the list and an interview at National Headquarters at the 2023 Fall Meetings, I got the nod and was installed as the 2024-2025 American Legion National Historian during National Convention last month in New Orleans.

Another piece of good news for Nebraska – we won 3rd place in the first ever digital history contest (https://www.legion.org/library/262579/first-digital-national-historians-contest-results-announced). If you are interested in viewing Nebraska's yearbook, or any of the other digital entries, visit: https://legionhistoryshowcase.omeka.net/exhibits/show/2024contestentries/2024-national-historian-s-cont/department-of-nebraska.

Speaking of the yearbook, major changes have been implemented for the National History Contest with the passage of Resolution #20 – Authorization for Conducting Department History Contest and Post History Showcase. According to Resolution #20, 2024 is the last year for the Post History Contest at the National level. Starting in 2025, post histories submitted to National on behalf of Departments will not be judged, but rather will be used as showcase pieces to serve as examples for other posts to develop their own histories. Even though not judged, all post submissions will receive a special certificate of recognition by the National Historian. If you are interested in submitting a post history showcase next year, please let me know and I can help you navigate the process.

I look forward to my responsibilities over the next year which will include judging the last traditional hard-copy post contest at Fall Meetings next month in Indianapolis and assisting the National Association of Department Historians of The American Legion (NADHAL) in their activities. In addition, I would like to get historians plugged in to any new initiatives that are likely to come out of the newly formed America 250 ad hoc committee at National. More to come on that. In the meantime, you can visit https://america250.org/ to learn about the upcoming 250th anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence.

Again, thank you for the opportunity to serve as your Department, and now National Historian, and I will work hard to make Nebraska proud!

Let us remember that membership is very important to our organization as upholding the Four Pillars of The American Legion. Membership report as of August 31, 2024. Nebraska squadrons are sitting at 4th in the Midwest Region, with a total of 6,889 members. Membership is at 532 for the 2025 membership year. Remember the importance of recruitment and retainment of members!



Important Information regarding Homestead Exemption for Disabled Veterans in 2025

The year 2025, requires all veteran categories to submit a Nebraska Homestead Exemption Application along with VA Certification dated on or after January 1, 2024. All applications should be provided to your county assessor on or before June 30, 2025.

To obtain your VA certification yourself you may use VA.gov online or the VA.gov app. You can scan the QR Codes below with your phone's camera to access your VA.gov account and print the needed information or send from the app to your email account. I highly encourage all to use VA.gov as this provides you a wealth of information, to include benefits information, payments, appointments, and prescriptions. The first QR code links to VA.gov and the second links to the VA app.

If you do not wish to use VA.gov and need assistance obtaining a current VA Disability or Spouse VA Status Certification, please contact your county veteran service officer or state veteran service officer.

Below are the three Disabled Veteran Homestead categories and what is required for each to maintain their homestead exemption.

Category #4V: 100% Permanently Disabled Service-Connected Veterans:

• Request or obtain a current VA Disability Certification dated after January 1, 2024.

• The disability rating on the certification must be certified on or before January 1, 2025.

• File your 2025 Homestead Exemption Application and current VA Disability Certification with your county assessor on or before June 30, 2025.

Category #4S: Surviving Spouses of Qualified Veterans:

• Request or obtain a current Spouse VA Status Certification dated after January 1, 2024.

• File your 2025 Homestead Exemption Application and a current Spouse VA Status Certification with your county assessor on or before June 30, 2025.

Category #7: 100% Temporarily Disabled Service-Connected Veterans or their Surviving Spouses:

• Request or obtain a current VA Disability or Spouse VA Status Certification dated after

January 1, 2024.

• If applicable, the disability rating must be certified on or before January 1, 2025.

•File your 2025 Homestead Exemption Application and current VA Disability or Spouse VA Status Certification with your county assessor on or before June 30, 2025.





Visit mylegion.org, it has lots of information on there to help you with your job as an officer in your squadron and gives you the ability to pay your dues online.

Do not forget about "Be The One". Remember that the Crisis Hotline number is 988 and press 1 for veterans.

In October, squadrons could participate in Halloween safety events. Posts and squadrons can conduct safety events and provide tips to children in the community.

Captain Monte Larue Moorberg

Captain Monte L. Moorberg from Grand Island was a graduate of the U.S. Air Force Academy, Class of 1961. On December 2, 1966, Moorberg was serving as Pilot of an F-105D Thunderchief of the 469th Tactical Fighter Squadron, 388th Tactical Fighter Wing, Korat Royal Thai Air Base, Thailand. Moorberg led a flight of F-105 Thunderchiefs against the Phuc Yen Petroleum and Oil Storage Facility, located 14 miles north of Hanoi, North Vietnam. Despite intense anti-aircraft fire, at least three SA-2 missile launches, exceptionally adverse weather, and a constant threat of MIG fighter attacks, Moorberg led his flight and successfully put his ordinance on the target.

Moorberg's calm and courageous leadership was instrumental in enabling his flight to return safely. While flying in the target area, his aircraft caught fire for unknown reasons, broke apart, and crashed, killing him. A strong enemy presence in the area prevented the recovery of Moorberg's remains at the time. In 1985, the Vietnamese government repatriated human remains correlating to this loss. U.S. Investigators were able to identify Captain Moorberg from those remains.

Moorberg's extraordinary heroism and superb airmanship earned him the U.S. Air Force second highest award for valor, the Air Force Cross."The President of the United States of America authorized by Title 10, Section 8742, United States Code, takes pride in presenting the Air Force Cross (Posthumously) to Captain Monte Larue Moorberg (AFSN 0-62699), US Air Force, for extraordinary heroism in military operations against an opposing armed force, while serving as Pilot of an F-105 Thunderchief of the 469th Tactical Fighter Squadron, 388th Tactical Fighter Wing." "His calm and courageous leadership was instrumental in enabling his flight to return safely. Through his extraordinary heroism, superb airmanship, and aggressiveness in the face of hostile forces, Capt Moorberg reflected the highest credit upon himself, and the US Air Force."

Monte was awarded the Air Force Cross, Distinguished Flying Cross, Purple Heart, Air Medal with Silver and 3 Bronze Oak Leaf Clusters, and other badges and awards. Capt Moorberg is buried in the Arlington National Cemetery. His name is located on Panel 13E Line 5 of the Vietnam Veteran Memorial Wall. He is memorialized on the Courts of the Missing at the National Memorial Cemetery of the Pacific. He served with honor in the US Air Force. He is remembered by the people of Nebraska. May his positive example inspire us; working together towards peace, mutual respect, and equality for all.



Since this is my first writing for the Legionnaire, I would like to introduce myself. My name is Steven Witmer and I have been a member of Bolton Post 19 in York for about 20 years. I have served as Post Chaplain for most of those 20 years. I also served as York County Commander for about 10 years. I am a retired Air Force veteran having served on active duty with deployments to Germany and Thailand. Then I joined the Nebraska Air National Guard where I served as 'weekender' for 5 years, and later acquired a full-time position as an AGR (active guard/reservist), retiring in 2001.

When I first met Commander Yochum, outward appearances would have labeled a chance meeting. I am not one who believes in chance, or accidental meetings. Everything happens because God has a reason. With that said, and with God's guidance, I will do the best I can as your Chaplain.

As this copy of the Legionnaire goes to press, we are approaching a crucial time in the life of our nation. Election day will soon be upon us. Hebrew 13:17 says "Have confidence in your leaders and submit to their authority, because they keep watch over you as those who must give an account". My only request is that before you cast your votes, prayerfully seek God. Our Creator should be the source of everything we say and do. Unfortunately, as imperfect humans, we don't always get it right. So, we ask His forgiveness, and ask His Spirit to come into us and guide us. 2 Chronicles 7:14 says "if my people who are called by my name, will humble themselves and pray and seek my face and turn from their wicked ways, then I will hear from heaven, and I will forgive their sin and will heal their land".

Membership Minute Steve Bartos, Membership Chairman

The 2025 American Legion membership year has certainly gotten off to an unusual --- and maybe a little rocky --- start.

There was some really good news announced at the national convention in New Orleans in August. For the first time in a number of years, The American Legion met and exceeded its national goal. There was a true growth in membership. With about a dozen departments meeting and exceeding their goals and a good influx of members from the direct mail solicitation program, the tide was turned. We need to build on that and be part of a similar experience this year.

Some other good news announced at the national convention was that Nebraska --- once again --- was recognized for being one of a small number of departments who achieved 100% reporting on their Consolidated Post Reports. Congratulations to all. The CPR is an important tool to measure our activity, so let's keep up the good work of being on that list again next year.

More good news, the 2025 department membership goals were established at the National Membership Workshop held in Indianapolis in July. All departments were asked --- or at least suggested --- to accept a goal of 3% more than their 2024 paid membership on July 1. And that included members who had gone to Post Everlasting. In effect, if our losses to death or non-renewal were only 5%, for example, the number of new, reinstated, or transferred-in members we'd need to acquire would be 8%. That's a lot!

However, Commander Yochum, Adjutant Salak, and I met with now-National Commander LaCoursiere to ask if we could try to generate a little more enthusiasm in our membership work this year by having a goal that still showed growth --but just not quite as much as would result by adding 3% to our July 1 count. Our discussion was productive, and Commander LaCoursiere agreed to a goal of 22,300 instead of 22,760. Let's take advantage of this more realistic goal and make every effort to achieve it.

Now for the rocky part of the start, because the amount of the recently-enacted dues increase couldn't be formally determined until the department convention, and because the dues notices printed and mailed by the national organization had to be finalized long before our convention, the decision was made to decline the first dues notice from Indianapolis to avoid what was likely to be a lot of confusion and heartache for posts that hadn't established or elected not to establish a new dues rate until it was officially adopted.

Our first dues notice from national should be arriving about the first week of October. If you haven't paid your dues. Please do so promptly to get us back on track. Posts ---- be prepared to process the influx of dues and keep Amanda busy. Also, be aware that because of the deferred first notice, the Early Bird Drawing has been pushed back to about November 11th.

Have a nice October.








Class B Senior State Champion Hickman Post 105 from Norris High School sponsored by Hickman Post 105.


